

According to the Fairfield County record of deeds, four of the boys became owners of acreage in the famous "Wilson Section". All of their deeds were dated June 15, 1807, and are as follows:

John	(born 1779)	250 acres for \$750.00
Jacob, the "Pioneer"	(born 1781)	296 " " 600.00
Job	(born 1787)	245 " " 490.00
Isaac	(born 1790)	250 " " 500.00

Jacob probably paid for his farm out of the proceeds from the sale of the farm his grandfather willed him. John, who was 26 years old when the family reached their new home in Ohio, may have accumulated enough to pay for his 250 acres and was probably married before coming to Ohio. Job, 18, and Isaac, 15, when coming to Ohio, were teenagers, yet acquired substantial acreages. These tracts and maybe John's tract were most likely from what the father David had contracted before building the cabin in the spring of 1805, as their mother did not take title at this time to any land. Most likely Job's farm of 245 acres adjoined Isaac's farm since Job died when 25 years of age without marriage. The mother and he must have lived together and at his death inherited his farm as Isaac's farm joined that of his mother. This explanation fits the circumstances and the statements contained in their biographies shown next.

Children #2 of David Wilson (C3#1) and Mary Miller.

1#2 John, b.11-15-1779; d.9-6-1834; m.1st Rebecca - ; probably before coming to Ohio, as he was not one of the seven who came with the mother. Most likely they spent their lives on the 250 acres acquired out of the eastern part of the "Wilson Section". Their one child #3:

1#3 George W., b.3-10-1806; d.11-9-1889; m.1st Barbara Miller 1-24-1835; she died August 31, 1838. Their one child #4:

1#4 Harriett, b.12-11-1835; d. - ; m.William Davis, 1-1-1862.

George next m.2nd Barbara Wilkin 1854, b.1817. Their one child:

2#4 John M., b.8-16-1860; d. - ; unmarried, Newark, Ohio.

2#2 Jacob, b.9-15-1781; d.10-11-1827; m.Nancy Colville, 3-7-1804.

He inherited 250 acres of land in Hardy County, Va. from his paternal grandfather in 1801. In the spring of 1803, he came to Licking County as its "Pioneer" Wilson settler and bought 296 acres in the "Wilson Section" from his uncle Colonel Benjamin Wilson. On this land he built a cabin near a big spring about a mile north of Newark, Ohio -- laid out in 1801. During his first summer of 1803, he raised a crop of corn on the rich river bottom of the North Fork of the Licking River. The next winter he returned to Hardy County where he was married in March of 1804; he then returned with his bride to the new home in Ohio, where he lived and died.

2#3 Amanda, b.1805; d. 1805.

3#3 David, b.6-28-1806; d. 1889; m.Amanda Seymour 3-31-1828; they died at Newark, Ohio; 5 children #4.

4#3 James Harvey, b.1808; d.1861; m. - ; died at Newark, O.; one child #4.

5#3 Mary, b.3-7-1810; d.1877; m.Robert Millegan 1831; died at Newark, O.; 4 children #4.

6#3 Elizabeth, b.11-12-1812; d.4-28-1899; m.William Stout 1834; died at St. Louisville, Licking County, O.; 3 children #4.

7#3 Benjamin J., b.3-22-?; d. - ; m.Theodosia Smith, 10-24-1855; died at Newark, O.; no children.
